



#### **GOING WILD (OR NOT)**

Those of you who took time out to spend an afternoon in Grayshott's Hidden Gardens in May would have delighted in the efforts of so many garden owners. Some of these gardens would easily be candidates for inclusion in the glossiest of garden magazines. Clearly an appeal to the orderliness of environments and high standards of horticulture. And yet this approach is now in conflict with the growing trend for wildness or, shall we say, a call for disorder.



There is clearly a battle going on between the environmental cause and the purist gardening argument. You don't have to look far to find plenty of advice on rewilding and how to "let nature back into the garden" but this often amounts to a token corner given over to various constructs to attract wildlife. It is noticeable from the televised RHS annual shows that this tension exists between the perfectly manicured and precise to the examples of wildness demonstrated by a mayhem of plants interspersed with old sheds or redundant building materials and machinery. All this tends to make me feel confused about what we should be designing into (or out of) our public landscapes. Is it all too tidy and precise and should we be more relaxed about allowing things to grow unchecked? It seems to me we are naturally conflicted when it comes to just how ordered we want our environment to be. I might be readily critical of an unkempt garden or scruffy public green and yet concede that it may make a genuine contribution to sustaining wildlife. I might equally curse as a stray bramble catches me unawares but having identified itself points me to the fruits it could well offer me when I come back in September to collect.

It's not that I don't appreciate order and have real admiration for the efforts of all who keep their gardens looking great and that of the volunteers whose hard work keeps Grayshott village greens both tidy and colourful but across the parish is there the right balance between order and disorder? The more we push towards order we move towards a more urban environment and that's something I think we should resist. I shall be interested to see how the Parish Council's view on this is reflected in its bid for Village of the Year in 2026.

Many centuries ago, when I was deciding what GCE's to take, my art master suggested art. "What, for '0' level?" I asked in surprise - "No", he replied, "Go for 'A' level." So I did and much to my surprise, I passed at the age of 16.


By now I had joined and left several art classes and clubs, entered exhibitions and sold some of my work - which was very exciting. I particularly enjoyed painting the common through the seasons or finding a beautiful black poppy in the garden which would only last a day, meaning I would have to pick it and paint it straight away in my home studio.

Most of my work is in watercolour, because it is sympathetic to the structure and colours of petals and leaves, although I do occasionally work in pastel, which gives John the opportunity to quip "Are you off with your crayons today, dear?"

Last year, I was invited to exhibit some paintings at the Church for the St Luke's festival where I was amazed by all the different arts and crafts on display. I am not the first to say it, but a couple of hours with a paintbrush in the hand is better than any therapy.

## 1985-2025 THE ARTS SOCIETY GRAYSHOTT CELEBRATES ITS 40TH ANNIVERSARY

More than 80 members of the Society enjoyed a delicious champagne tea reception in the lovely 17thC Long Hall at Ramster Hall near Chiddingfold on 22nd July to mark their 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Special guests Hampshire and Isle of Wight Area Arts Society Chair, Charles Harris and his wife Marilyn accompanied Society Chair, Jackie Bearman and President, Derek Linney in welcoming members.



Through talks from world class lecturers, visits, social events and tours in the UK or overseas, the Society enables members to expand and share their interest in the arts and our heritage. Subjects cover a wide range from archaeology to architecture, museums to music, painting to pottery, sculpture to sewing, textiles to theatre. We also support the arts locally, especially for young people at, for example, Grayshott Primary School, Undershaw and the Hindhead Music Centre. We have over 170 members from Grayshott, Headley, Hindhead, Liphook, and surrounding villages.

The Society started when our sister Society in Haslemere had a long waiting list. A steering group was formed and Sheila Sheath volunteered to take the lead in setting up the new Society, becoming our first Chairman and later President. Now in her 90s but still a member, Sheila describes how the national Arts Society, to which we are affiliated, gave her a modest grant of £50 to help, with the proviso that a trial lecture was held to establish if there was sufficient demand.

She and her husband still had to put up some of their own money initially, to pay for the lecturer and hire of the village hall. Sheila recalls how she engaged the best lecturer on the Arts Society's panel and was delighted when over 80 people turned up. She and her colleagues then put together a full programme of monthly lectures for 1985. The Society was up and running!

Membership grew rapidly and the first outings were also held that year - a visit to the magical Huguenot House in Spitalfieds and a very special tour and


I was in dire need of a lot of help.



#### THE RYDER CORIN INTERVIEW

This summer I heard that one of my favourite Beaver's scout leaders, Alice Murphy, was getting a new role in the Church, so I went to meet her and ask all about it (and other things)!

**R:** I first met you when I was in Beavers. What is your new role? **A:** My new role is a Children's and Families Worker for the church. We don't know quite what that role looks like yet as we have not had one before so it will evolve. You'll have to watch this space!

**R:** What is it like? Is it similar to beavers?

**A:** As much as I'm dealing with children and their families yes, but Beavers and Scouts tell us what to do so we follow their structure but this I get to decide.

R: What do you do for your new role?

**A:** Initially I need to create a programme of things for children to do from babies right up until the base, which is secondary school. So, I have to make plans to engage children all the way through. Your age group is our deficit – there's nothing for kids your age and that's the gap!

**R:** What are you most excited about this role?

**A:** I am excited about watching children come through because I get so excited when my Beavers turn up at the Base, but I've missed that time in the middle. I'm so excited to see these kids come through, and now I actually get to see the journey.

**R:** Are you still a Beavers scout leader? What's your favourite thing about scouts?

**A:** Yes, I am, and my favourite thing is the skills we teach are traditional, like building fires, knot tying and camps. It's not evolved into can you take a selfie and how to make a coffee, it's still outdoor skills, resilience and to keep trying. Skills for life!

**R:** I know two things you said there; I know how to tie a reef know, but I also know how to make coffee!

A: Then you've got every skill you need for life!

R: But there's one thing I'm still working on, riding a bike.

**A:** That's a challenge, and what's frustrating is some kids just do it and for others it's much harder work.

**R:** I was actually quite proud because when the guy was helping me, he told me to look straight, and I cycled for about 3 seconds and then I put my brakes on.

A: You just have to keep going

**R:** Both roles are working with children. Is there a difference working with children and adults?

**A:** Yes absolutely, kids are so much easier to engage with and work with. If children don't like what they're doing, they'll tell you. If they're bored they'll tell you, and that kind of direct feedback is much easier to deal with.

R: So if we don't like something we might go 'this is boring'

**A:** Yes, not many children are quite that direct, but it's a breath of fresh air when they are. You know where you stand with children.

R: And adults?

**A:** Adults are harder. But maybe I've not had enough practice, and I'm just a massive kid!

R: If you could do this job anywhere in the world where would it be?

A: Grayshott!

R: Except Grayshott!

**A:** Haha, I've got a convoluted answer for this one, because actually I am called to do this job here, as this is my community and this is about being here. So I don't have a fantasy tropical destination because this job is for me to do here.

**R:** So you don't want to do this job in the Amazon Rainforest? **A:** I'm not sure how many families we have got in the Amazon Rainforest but there are families there, I guess.

**R:** If you could do any job in the world, what would it be? (Except this job!)

**A:** You've foiled me because it would be this job. It would be the thing that is in front of me at this point in time which is a need for me to do, is the job I need to do. I want to make a difference to the people around me, to my community, the world. If I make a difference to this little piece I've made a difference.

**R:** I think I have a recommendation for you; counsellor, because you work with children.

**A:** Maybe this is your scoop Ryder, that that's my next move!

**R:** What did you want to be when you were a child?

A: I wanted to be an undertaker, a funeral director, for a long time. Again that was about looking after my community, and people, at a point of need. I always fancied washing the ducks or birds when there were oil leaks in the sea. When you saw people washing sea birds in fairy liquid, I always wanted to do that!

R: What is your favourite childhood memory?

**A:** Our garden. Where we grew up we had a big garden with a great big pond. As an only child I would just amuse myself outside, fishing tadpoles out the pond, camping at the bottom of the garden in a scout tent all summer.

R: When you were growing up what was your favourite book?

**A:** It was Alice in Wonderland and Through the Looking Glass. And obviously everyone thought I liked them because my name is Alice, but I thought they were fabulous!

R: How about if your favourite book was Alice and the Interviewer?

A: What would happen in this book? Would we go on adventures?

R: In the church?

A: That's always an adventure!

R: If you could be an animal, what would you be?

**A:** A dragonfly. Because dragonflies pre-date dinosaurs. So, whatever destroyed dinosaurs, they managed to evolve around and were resilient to be able to survive. They're the ultimate symbol of survival and being delicate. Unlike cockroaches, they're resilient without armour.

R: Do you have a hero?

**A:** Women are my heroes. All women! I've got friends that have dealt with more in half a lifetime that anyone should ever have to. It's back to resilience; they get up and do everything in spite of all the other stuff. So women are my heroes.

**R:** I actually have 4 heroes; David Attenborough, Steve Backshall, Chris Packham and Greta Thunberg

A: I like your list, that's a good list.

**R:** What is your favourite thing about Grayshott?

A: My St Lukes family. I grew up here, my family grew up here, my dad grew up here. So it's the roots and the community. But for now it's my St Lukes family.

**R:** My four favourite things are Forest School, Scouts, visiting the fire station and Waggoners Wells

**R:** The environment is very important to me. What advice to you have for everyone to protect our planet for us children?

**A:** That everybody should do what they can do. There's a tendency to say what difference can I make, but it's back to the theory that if I make this much difference and my neighbour makes as much difference as they can do, then across the world that's a massive difference. So do what you can do and don't feel bad about what you can't.

**R:** I usually like to pick up litter, and my mum does something as well as we don't use palm oil at home.

**A:** That's the one that impacts on the rain forest and the orangutang's impact. I like to use reusable things, so anything that can be substituted by fabric and washed that's something I do.

**R:** Thanks Alice, I've really enjoyed this interview, it's been one of my favourites!

Back at the start of 2025, Chris Grocock offered to teach anyone who was interested the rudiments of New Testament Greek. The course was offered to anyone who was curious – not just church members – as a way of exploring the New Testament documents and keeping grey matter going. That was one of the aims Chris had in mind for himself as well as for the people taking part – he's been a student of and a teacher of Greek in its Classical and New Testament forms for over 40 years, and as the saying goes, you 'use it or lose it.' And so, with Classical Greek dropped from the curriculum at the school where he works, he thought it would be something helpful for everyone.

Other reasons for having a go a studying Greek include the insights it gives into our own language, and the links and derivations which many English words have. Chris remembers once in hospital raising a concern about a large lump he had on his arm. The registrar who looked at it said it was nothing to worry about – it was a 'subcutaneous haematoma.' He shouldn't have said it to a Classics teacher. Two Latin words and two Greek ones translate as 'underskin blood-lump.' A nasty bruise, in other words. There are many English words – specially part of the 'churchy' vocabulary – which owe their origins to Greek.



The New Testament documents – the four Gospels and Acts, the Letters, the Book of Revelation - were all written in the basic Greek used as a common language all over the eastern Mediterranean in the first century AD. The different writers in the New Testament have different styles: Luke's Greek is polished and erudite (he was a doctor) while Mark's gospel is racy, fastpaced, sometimes breathless. The writers wanted above all to communicate. Even very simple steps in learning Greek can shed fresh light on the context and background of the New Testament. In addition, there was already a Greek translation of the Old Testament (originally composed in Hebrew with a tiny bit of Aramaic) called the Septuagint, composed according to tradition in Alexandria by a team of seventy scholars. The New Testament writers made a lot of use of that as they were writing their accounts of Jesus and penning letters to the churches which were just beginning to be established in the Mediterranean world.

The course kicked off with some introductory material and background, and the first challenge – learning to recognize the Greek alphabet (useful on holiday – it hasn't changed).

Seventeen brave folks met in the first meeting, a number which gradually whittled itself down to seven, for a variety of reasons – not always because learning a language is very challenging! From the period from January to June we met nineteen times and made our way to the end of chapter 13 of Wenham's *Elements of New Testament Greek*. We covered the alphabet, the present tense, all five of the cases with some prepositions and had a look at the strange way that NT Greek adds prefixes, augments and endings to verbs to create the imperfect tense – a challenge for us, but something which must have been second nature if you grew up with it! We made sure that there was plenty of class participation and a shared effort, especially when it came to writing sentences in English *back into Greek*.




No matter how much of the course they did, those who came found it fun as well as a challenge, and kept Chris on his toes as well. 'Expands the mind' and 'Uses parts of the brain I haven't exercised for years' were two comments in this vein; Chris was also flattered to get some compliments about making it fun even while introducing some of the oddities of New Testament Greek (the language



'works' in a very different way to the English we use) and being honest and upfront when something particularly challenging comes along.

We plan to resume in September, and it will be intriguing to see how much revision we need to do before we press on with more grammar and vocabulary. Our textbook has reassured us that 'we have now met over half of all the words in the New Testament,' which is something! If there is interest from anyone who hasn't been able to join in this time we could do it again and then join both groups together after Christmas 2025, or even try to fit two groups into the schedule, though that is complicated. In addition, Chris is planning to offer tuition in Latin, Greek and Classical Civilization to 'A' Level under the title 'Dr Classics' from September, but that is a wholly different exercise!





### **GRAYSHOTT'S** WARTIME MEMORIES

At the 80th anniversary of the end of the Second World War, anyone who was an adult at the time will now have at least 98 years to their credit. It will soon pass beyond living memory. Events of the last few years are a reminder that the ideals our forebears fought for - freedom and democracy - are hard won, and that even in the 21st century Europe is not immune to battle and bloodshed on its soil.

Since the end of National Service in 1963 none of our citizens have been conscripted into the armed services. Those who volunteer to serve currently make up less than half of 1% of our population. A miniscule proportion of our civilians have ever heard shots fired in anger, let alone had bombs fall on their homes. We are the lucky generations. Now seems like a good time to review



Grayshott's experience of WW2, whilst we can still talk to some of our village's eyewitnesses to one of modern history's greatest events. Our new book is to some extent a survey of Grayshott during the war, and we hope to convey at least a sense of how it was to live here. But we also record today's villagers' recollections of their war, wherever it was, as well as the stories and family legends of younger generations. Some of us baby-boomers were perhaps indelibly imprinted with war yarns by our parents or grandparents. Others sometimes have no inkling, and have to winkle out dormant memories or rediscover them from family papers. Experiences which we find extra-ordinary were, to those of the time, so completely ordinary as to barely register, and have to be sought out. They all add to the richness of Grayshott's memory bank.

For some people the war demanded acts of courage or sacrifice which to many of us are unimaginable. Others, whether in uniform, factories or fields, were small but cumulatively vital cogs in the big machine. For most perhaps it was just a case of enduring what came along and enjoying it when they could. There are stories of each in the book.

Thanks to generous grants from East Hampshire District Council and Hampshire Archives Trust we are able to make the book available to villagers at no charge. It was released on 15th August, to commemorate the 80th anniversary of VE Day, and copies can be obtained from Business Connections, the Community Library and other outlets around the village. A pdf copy is available on our website for those further afield.

### **GRAYSHOTT** TEA PARTY

Ruth reminded us of the legacy of Romania's president, the dictator, Nicolae Ceausescu, whose natalist policies led to the abandonment of children in underfunded state run orphanages, where young children were left in cribs 24 hours a day with no stimulation or interaction, with only the most basic care and no physical contact apart from cleaning and feeding provided. Dr Nathan Fox studied the effect of the neglect on the development of the children. He found delayed cognitive function, motor development, language and emotional behaviour. He found the rooms eerily quiet as the children had learned that crying brought no response. The children had smaller brains, with less grey and white matter. However, those children who were fortunate enough to be removed before their 2nd birthday and adopted regained normal brain function.

There has been little research into tactile impairment yet we know that touch releases endorphins, reduces stress, helps the immune system and lowers blood pressure.

Reminiscing is a sign of mental health and objects create focus, they are powerful stimulants with an emotional pull so Ruth likes to provide artifacts in her museum work for visitors to touch and she brought some with her for us to explore, which stimulated memories, laughter and conversation amongst us.

We meet next month on 2nd September for



our Summer Outing. This year we are going to Polesden Lacey.



My name is Mihai and I'm going into my third and final year of Philosophy and Politics at the University of Bristol. I'm also a proud Grayshottian, having moved into the village at the age of 10 and attended Grayshott Primary, and later, Bohunt School and Sixth Form. What I've learnt (and you've probably heard it all before) is that you should expect and embrace challenges. Things will go wrong. You will go to uni and things that you didn't even think to consider will go wrong. Maybe in November your room will get really really cold and the heater won't work and you'll freeze for a while until it's fixed/replaced- that's not entirely impossible. Something which I'm still grappling with is that you can't control or prepare for everything.

Before leaving home I really wanted to know exactly what uni life was going to be like so that I could thrive in my new environment. I watched all the Youtube videos I could find of people talking about uni accom, student nightlife, societies, lectures, Bristol, transport, taking notes, socialising, budgeting etc. But that was the wrong approach! Thinking I could know everything made me feel comfortable but when I faced difficulties I was out of my comfort zone and unprepared and struggled to understand how, because I had relied too much on being ready.

I'm not saying don't inform yourself but don't try to predict how things should be because you'll be surprised. Simply accept that you'll be challenged and that the challenges will be hard and not something you can prepare for, because no challenge ever isn't as otherwise it wouldn't be a challenge. That difference in thinking will be more beneficial to you.

### **LEAVING GRAYSHOTT** FOR UNI

These last two years have probably been the toughest yet and have really tested my faith, my hope, my positivity and my resilience. And admittedly I haven't always made the best decisions. But that's okay because lately I'm learning to care less. How many times have you and I faced amazing difficulties that we believed would be the end of us and come out okay? I think it's funny how everytime something is not the end of us, some time goes by, we face another problem, we forget we made it though okay the last time or we tell ourselves this one is actually more important than the one before and we start worrying all over again.

Maybe it really is bigger but it won't be the end of you now will it. There is so much hope in remembering that there's a tomorrow and that you're going to live to see it and it's that hope which will help you face the night and see the sunrise. Maybe then as you're basking in the glory of the new sun, you'll reflect on everything that has happened and be thankful because you wouldn't be here without it. That's what the last two years have taught me and that's what I'll try to remember when I meet the next big thing.

On a lighter note I don't need to tell anyone how fun and exciting coming to uni can be so good luck to all the new students, even if you're just moving schools!
